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Teenage driver brags on MySpace about rollover wreck on 17 Mile Drive

WITHIN HOURS of his crash in Pebble Beach Friday afternoon, the teenage driver who flipped his SUV while speeding down 17 Mile Drive with his buddies inside evidently posted a photo of the crushed car on his MySpace page and dubbed himself "Mr. Indestructible."

"Just to hear this cavalier attitude about it is just appalling," said California Highway Patrol officer Art

The Pine Cone is not identifying the driver, a student at Pacific Grove High School, because of his age.

Carbonel said the driver, who will turn 17 Saturday, had at least three other 15- and 16-year-old kids in the 1992 Oldsmobile Bravada when he lost control. Young drivers are not permitted to carry other minors in their cars for their first year on the road. Last July, two Carmel High School students died

and three were injured when 16-year-old Alex Robbins, who had a probationary driver's license, drove his truck off Highway 1 near Lucia.

The teens in the May 11 wreck reportedly sustained minor injuries, and some fled to a Pebble Beach home

Dry year puts big dent in Peninsula's water supply

WHILE RAINFALL was only about half of average this winter, runoff was even lower — just 17 percent of normal leading Monterey Peninsula water officials to call for stepped-up conservation.

This year is shaping up to be as bad as 1994 and perhaps as bad as 1990 in terms of lack of rainfall and effect on the Carmel River flow," said David Berger, executive director of the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District.

This year — as in the droughts of the late 1970s and late 1980s — has been "critically dry," a MPWMD designation that means there has been less than 14,700 acre-feet of runoff measured at the San Clemente Dam, conditions which make it rough for steelhead fish and other wildlife in the river.

After two wet years

"On average," said MPWMD senior hydrologist Darby Fuerst, "we get 70,000 acre-feet a year of runoff at the San Clemente Dam. And this year we are only going to get about 12,000 to 13,000 acre-feet."

In comparison, 2005 and 2006 were wet years with more than 107,000 acre-feet each, while 2004 was "below normal," with just under 40,000 acre-feet of runoff flow.

A drought is marked by two consecutive dry or critically dry years. If next year is similar to this year, the Peninsula

Tiny addition comes at a very big price

■ Illegal guest room discovered and ordered to be removed

m A}$ NEW Carmel homeowner seeking to add 12 square feet to a bathroom so she can bring her washer and dryer inside must also turn her third bedroom back into a garage, the planning commission unanimously decided last

Wednesday. Had Elizabeth Harmon not asked permission to make the small addition to her Monte Verde Street house, the city might never have known about the room illegally installed by a previous owner.

"As originally built, the residence included a singlecar garage on the lower level," senior planner Sean Conroy wrote in his May 9 staff report for the commission. "At some point, the garage door was replaced with French doors and the interior was converted to living space. This was done without a permit."

Because the conversion occurred before she bought the house, Harmon requested a variance from the municipal code section requiring onsite parking, but Conroy said the exception would be difficult to justify.

It's legal to grant a variance if (1) a property's physical constraints make meeting a zoning standard impossible, (2) it would not constitute granting a special privilege, (3) "the situation or condition for which the variance is sought was not the result of actions of the existing or any prior owner of the property," and (4) the variance would not conflict with the general plan. Conroy said those findings could not be made.

But the commission should approve the small addi-

tion, Conroy said, as long as the owner also removes 12 square feet of site coverage on her 6,000-square-foot property in order to conform with city standards.

Harmon, who first came to Carmel in 1931 at the age of 1 and said she recently returned in order to spend the rest of her life here, asked commissioners to let her keep the illegally installed bedroom to accommodate her visiting friends and family and, later, a live-in caregiver.

Weekly local farmers market sought for Pacific Grove

LOOK OUT, Monterey. Pacific Grove is taking steps to host a farmers market of its own that could be up and running

Mayor Dan Cort is pushing for the market, which he hopes will be set up on Lighthouse Avenue in downtown P.G.

"It would feature lots of organic produce," Cort said. "We

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have only heard a 100 percent positive response to it."

Unlike some farmers markets, Cort said he would like to see the P.G. market concentrate on items sold by local ven-

"It would start by being a food market, then evolve into a little more," he said. "It's not going to be a flea market. We can have organic food and other foods grown in the local region here instead of being trucked in from 150 miles away."

The market would not only offer local produce growers another venue, it would benefit downtown businesses since it would encourage visitors to patronize restaurants and shops.

"It would help open up storefronts because people would come in and see our downtown," Cort said.

The market would also run after the once-monthly Pacific Grove Artwalk.


"That is what we need to be a more dynamic downtown," Cort said.

The City of Monterey offers a farmers market on Alvarado Street Tuesday afternoons. Monterey Peninsula College hosts a market Thursdays.

Cort said he expects a public hearing about the P.G. farmers market to be held at the first council meeting in June. A committee is also being formed to discuss it, he said.

"The chamber of commerce and the city will get together to see if we can find an operator for the whole thing," he said. 'We would like to be looking at it this summer."

Bicycle cabs proposed

Cort is also hoping to offer farmers market patrons alternative transportation by way of bicycle rickshaw rides.

Pedicabs, as they are also called, are bicycles fitted with a carriage to carry passengers. Cort said a couple of private individuals have expressed interest in opening a pedicab business in P.G.

"What they do is help us engage our residents and visitors to see our community," he said.

The service would be good for elderly residents who might want to attend the farmers market but don't want to drive or walk, he said.

Cities such as Washington, D.C., New York and Denver offer pedicab services, which charge customers a fee based on the number of passengers and the distance traveled.

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
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Epoxy patches leak in CHS pool

A DIVER located and repaired a slow leak in Carmel High School's new \$3.4 million swimming pool last week, ensuring the boys training for this weekend's Central Coast Section championships at Stanford and the Barracuda swim club can continue

School officials first became aware of the leak about six weeks ago, when they noticed the pool's recently installed meter indicated unexpectedly high water use, according to Rick Blanckmeister, chief business official for Carmel Unified School District. Investigation of a nearby storm drain showed water running into it that appeared to be coming from the pool.

Workers checked all the pumps to make sure they weren't to blame, and two divers took turns scrutinizing the interior of the new 40-meter pool, which was formally dedicated April 27.

The divers floated drops of colored dye near each of its 40 underwater lights with the idea that any leaks would draw the dye. Nothing happened.

But while inspecting a main drain at the deep end, "one of the divers noticed something that didn't look quite the same as the rest of the seam," in the Myrtha vinyl-coated stainless steel pool, Blanckmeister said. Another dye test confirmed the suspicious spot in the seam was the source of the leak.

The pool remained filled while a diver repaired the leak with a small epoxy patch, according to Blanckmeister, who said all the users seem happy with the new facility.

"I haven't used it myself," he added.

One outside group, Barracuda Aquatics Monterey Peninsula, has been swimming in it since last month at a district-imposed rate of \$50 per hour. The user fees for off-season — when the school's own swimming, diving

and water polo programs are not in session - are not yet set but will likely be higher because the pool would be cheaper to maintain during that time if it went unused.

It will also require a full year to develop a reliable estimate of the new pool's operating

costs, including water, energy and chemical consumption, Blanckmeister said. User fees are based on operating costs.

40-The meter Myrtha replaced pools that were so old they failed to meet current safety standards **SCUBA** divers use dye to track down a leak in a seam

and were too shallow, requiring CHS swim and water polo meets to be held elsewhere. The project, which entailed demolishing the old pools, reconfiguring the area to accommodate the new pool, installing necessary infrastructure and making other changes, was completed just a few months ago. But paying the bills remains a challenge, and Friends of Carmel Aquatics continues to solicit donations.

According to Blanckmeister, the group has provided \$183,000 out of a total pledge of \$250,000 to help pay for some of the basic installation, as well as necessary accessories like the scoreboard and lane lines.

Parent Mike Rianda paid more than \$400,000 for the pool itself, which had been used during Olympic Trials in Indiana, and turned it over to the Carmel Unified School District for \$200,000.

To pay for most of the \$3.4 million project, the CUSD board of education earmarked \$1 million in general fund money, with the balance coming from the \$21.5 million bond voters approved in 2005.



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
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HOME INVADER GETS EIGHT YEARS, EIGHT MONTHS

m HE}$ 29-YEAR-OLD King City resident who embarked on a failed crime spree in Carmel last April was sentenced to eight years and eight months in prison after admitting to five felonies, including residential robbery, burglary and car theft, the Monterey County District Attorney's Office announced

Joe Ramirez, now 29, and his female accomplice, Jessica Rodriguez, were burglarizing a Carmel Point home on April 18, 2006, when the owners returned to find an unfamiliar car backed up to their garage. They attempted to stop the burglars from leaving, but the duo fled, leading police officers and sheriff's deputies on a chase through the neighborhoods near Carmel Mission.

The couple ditched the stolen SUV on Rio Road and tried

to escape on foot. Rodriguez was soon captured, but Ramirez continued running. He entered three homes but left the first two after being confronted by the residents. In the third, Ramirez demanded car keys and forcibly robbed a woman who was recuperating from a broken neck. He threw her to the kitchen floor and attempted to bind her with packing tape, but she escaped, ran upstairs and dialed 911.

Ramirez was later captured hiding in bushes near Highway 1 after Carmel Police Cpl. Steve Rana spotted him and alerted deputies, who trained a Taser light on him, explained what it was and ordered him to come out.

At the time of his arrest, Ramirez was on felony probation in Santa Cruz County, according to deputy district attorney Bob Burlison. Last November, Rodriguez pleaded guilty to



Carmel Foundation hopes folks will 'Give from the Heart'

SINCE IT receives no tax dollars, the Carmel Foundation relies on donations to keep its programs for seniors up and running.

To shore up its \$2.4 million budget and fund some "special projects," this week the foundation announced a new program called, "Giving from the Heart."

Catering to more than 4,400 Peninsula residents aged 55 and older, the group, founded in 1950, provides low-cost lunches, meal delivery for the homebound, transportation to medical appointments and shopping trips, and 50 classes or activities each week. It also supplies most of the affordable senior housing in Carmel.

"Caring and charitable individuals have ensured the continuation and success of the foundation with their support," said the foundation's development associate, Jennifer Martinez. "This generosity allows us to provide the tools for successful aging by enriching and improving the lives of

She ticked off a list of particular endeavors for which the foundation hopes to raise money.

■ \$40,000 for the purchase and installation of a new generator that would enable the foundation's kitchen to remain open when power fails. "Many local seniors rely on our meals for their health and well being," Martinez said, and continuing that service, especially during an extended power outage, is critical. In addition, "a new generator would provide the opportunity for use of our facilities during a disaster or citywide emergency."

■ \$15,000 for 12 new computers for the Computer Learning Center where members participate in a variety of classes ranging from introductory to advanced. Computer classes help seniors learn valuable skills, increase their knowledge and keep in touch with friends and family.

"In fact, one of our members enjoyed meeting her greatgranddaughter for the first time by watching a video online," Martinez reported.

■ \$160,000 for transportation to medical appointments and stores for those who can no longer drive and have no family members in the area to help. Public transportation on the Peninsula is not comprehensive enough to deliver most people to their doctors' offices, and few can afford a cab ride to every appointment, according to Martinez.

But donors' support will enable the foundation to "continue to connect people to their community and to life," she

Flames destroy cars but spare C.V. house

A FIRE that mysteriously started in a Ford SUV ended up totaling that vehicle, a Chevy Tahoe parked next to it, and the carport they were occupying outside a Carmel Valley Ranch condo last Wednesday night, but more than a dozen fire-fighters kept it from spreading to the home.

"The car where the fire actually started appeared it hadn't been used for two days," reported Carmel Valley Fire Division Chief Ron Lemos, who served as incident commander on the call. "It doesn't seem suspicious, but it's kind of weird."


A 911 call around 7:30 p.m. May 9 alerted the station to a vehicle fire at Carmel Valley Ranch, but the emergency was upgraded to a structure fire when it was learned the car was in a carport.

The house is saved

Two engines and two water tenders, for a total of 14 people, responded. By the time they arrived, the two SUVs and the carport were in flames. The residents — a husband and wife, and two kids — were outside.

"We just mainly knocked it down and kept it from spreading to the house," Lemos said. "Everything went well from our side."

No one was injured, but Lemos estimated the damage at \$16,000 to \$18,000 for the Tahoe and \$8,000 for the Ford, including the contents of both cars, and \$25,000 for the carport.



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
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

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Students spread the word to 'fight the bite'

TWO MONTEREY Peninsula teens — Katy Felsinger from Carmel High School and Amanda Palmer of Robert Louis Stevenson School — represented the Carmel chapter of the American Red Cross at the International Conference of Measles/Malaria Advocates in Washington, D.C., which they attended with Theresa Arlotto, co-chair of the chapter's international services committee.

"The pair are taking a leadership role in the movement to eradicate measles, the world's deadliest disease preventable by vaccination, and malaria, a deadly disease that also is preventable," according to Tia Gindick, who handles public relations for the local Red Cross chapter.

Malaria, a mosquito-borne disease which was nearly wiped out with the banned pesticide DDT, has made a dramatic comeback and now kills a child in Africa every 30 sec-

The American Red Cross works with the World Health

Organization, UNICEF, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the United Nations Foundation and the International Red Cross to help fight the diseases.

Red Cross youth chapters are helping with prevention and education, including raising funds to buy insecticide-treated bed nets that keep malaria-bearing mosquitos from biting people as they sleep. The groups are also mobilizing thousands of volunteers throughout Africa to educate more than 10 million people to "fight the bite."

And according to Gindick, the battle against the deadly but preventable measles has already contributed to a 60 percent decrease in the disease's transmission and death rate during the past five years. A measles vaccination injection costs less than \$1.

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Pebble Beach project heads back to coastal commission

ONE YEAR after the Pebble Beach Company withdrew its application for a new golf course, equestrian center and 160 hotel rooms in Del Monte Forest, the California Coastal Commission is expected to revisit the ballot measure that cleared the way for the development and put hundreds of acres of Monterey pine forest into open space preserves when voters approved it in November 2000.

The coastal panel could let the ballot measure go into effect, or it could overturn it.

When the Monterey County Board of Supervisors, at the request of the Pebble Beach Co., had the application withdrawn in June 2006, Mark Massara, an attorney for the Sierra Club, which opposes the P.B. project, accused the company of pulling the item at the last minute in order to "shop for an

accommodating commission."

"I think it would be correct to say that [the Pebble Beach Co.] thinks they have a better chance now," Massara said Wednesday.

In March, Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger fired coastal commission vice-chair Meg Caldwell, a Stanford professor and staunch conservationist, and replaced her with Steve Blank, a teacher at UC Berkeley and Stanford.

Several other commissioners have come onboard since the Pebble Beach Co.'s application was withdrawn.

A representative with the Carmel Development Co., which is handling permits for the project, couldn't be reached for comment.


The Pebble Beach Co. contends the development, officially named "The Del Monte Forest Plan: Forest Preservation and Development Limitations," would provide unprecedented protection for the most vital parts of the pine

forest because it places more than 900 acres (nearly 500 within Del Monte Forest) of pine forest and other land into conservation areas. In addition, the company would forego development of hundreds of homesites allowed under the zoning that existed before the ballot measure was approved.

Many environmentalists oppose the new golf course because it would require the removal of thousands of pine trees and affect other native species. Their campaign against the P.B. Co. project has been led by coastal commission executive director Peter Douglas, who says Monterey pines warrant special protection under the Coastal Act, even though the tree is one of the most common in the world.

The project includes 160 hotel rooms, underground parking at the Lodge and Spanish Bay, 60 new employee residences, 34 residential lots, and road and infrastructure improvements.





measure and said five kids were in the SUV when it crashed.

Though CHP officer Nicholas Fishbough has yet to conclude his investigation of the accident, Carbonel said the cause was identified as "unsafe speed." It occurred at 17 Mile Drive and Old 17 Mile Drive at 4:50 p.m.

If Fishbough decides to charge the driver with violating his provisional license, the teen could lose his driving privilege for a year, Carbonel said.

"That's the harshest penalty," he said. "Part of the idea is to discourage these kids from doing what they do."

The California Vehicle Code is "very, very strict," when it comes to teens' rights to carry passengers, Carbonel said. Contrary to

what many parents and kids believe, a simple note from a parent will not suffice.

"The bottom line is if it's a dire emergency where no other means of transportation exists," he said. "Parents need to know what their kids are doing and understand the law as well."

A few days after the accident, the photo of the crushed car was no longer on the front page of the teenage driver's MySpace site. Instead, a photo showed him shirtless, wearing dark glasses and striking a pose. The caption showed he had included the nickname, "Rollin."

Sewer fees going up, CAWD says

THE CARMEL Area Wastewater District is raising its rates for residences and businesses, the district announced.

Residential rates will increase from \$301 per year to \$319 per year for 2007/08 and to \$337 per year for 2008/09. The increase is equivalent to about \$1.50 per month for both years. Rates for businesses increase but vary from 1.71 percent to 10.79 percent, depending on the type of business.

CAWD said reasons for the rate increase include actual costs to operate and maintain the wastewater facility, increased costs of power, fuel, insurance and the transportation and disposal of biosolids.

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


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


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
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Volunteer firefighters host Big Sur festival

School supporters' gifts exceed \$2 million

THE FRIENDS of Carmel Unified Schools distributed \$70,000 last Wednesday night to buy cameras, computers, gardening supplies and other items not covered in the district's budget, according to board member and former River School principal Sharron Douglas. The gifts pushed FOCUS' contributions past \$2 million since its inception in 1979.

"I was on the receiving end for so many years — it's so gratifying" to give, Douglas said after the annual party at Carmel Middle School attended by teachers and staff from the district's schools.

Each month, FOCUS issues "small grants" of \$1,000, but it only distributes large gifts once a year. At the May 9 event, FOCUS donated \$69,000 to the preschools and elementary, middle and high schools to help pay for audio systems, sand tables, computers, school gardens, art appreciation programs, software, lighting systems, cardiovascular gym equipment, cameras and bird banding equipment, according to Douglas.

The group also held drawings to give 10 teachers \$100 each, bringing the total grants distributed this year to



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"We have excellent schools and are pleased to be able to support them," Douglas said.

FOCUS holds a few major fundraisers that enable it to meet its mission of supporting programs that get little or no money in the district's regular budget.

Its annual phone-a-thon took place in February, and the Golf for FOCUS tournament is set for June 27 at Poppy Hills

Golf Course in Pebble Beach. (Douglas said this year's event will be held in memory of Paul Porter, the Northern California Golf Association CEO who died last September.)

"People are very generous in donating," Douglas said. "We have a lot of community support."

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

EVEN PEOPLE who aren't really into motorsports will have reason to visit Mazda Raceway Laguna Seca for this weekend's U.S. Sports Car Invitational, event organizers are willing to bet. From watching four-on-

four soccer, to being able to pedal their own bicycles around the track, spectators will get more than the usual excitement of a weekend of car racing.

Of course, the racing gets top billing, and the Grand-Am Rolex Sports Car Series features drivers testing their skills behind the wheels of more than 50 Daytona Prototypes and GT sports cars that look fast even when standing still. The Grand American Road Racing Association was established in 1999 "to return stability to major league sports car road racing in North America," with cars driven by veterans Scott Pruett, Jorg Bergmeister and Christian Fittipaldi, and upand-comers like 18-year-old Colin Braun.

Among them is Alex Gurney, son of racing legend Dan Gurney and a championship contender following his and teammate Jon Fogarty's win in their No. 99 GAINSCO/Bob Stallings Racing Pontiac-Riley Daytona Prototype in Mexico City in March. They battled during the grueling 24-hour race at Daytona, and since the season began, four different two-driver teams have won the four different races.

At his debut in 2005, Gurney was immediately fast in qualifying and started the race in pole position. Last year, he finished second.



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

Despite the challenges of becoming an artist in life's midstream, few were surprised when Fassett suddenly became a prolific painter. Her grandmother was Jane Gallatin Powers, a pioneering Carmel artist. Her brother, Kaffe Fassett, is one of the world's most acclaimed textile artists. Her daughter, Erin Gafill, and her grandson, Chi Birmingham, are gifted painters.

Besides being surrounded by artists, Fassett's lifelong love of knitting no doubt eased her transition into the art world.

"Knitting is a de-stresser," said Fassett, who will present a demonstration at Big Sur Gallery Saturday. "The Greeks have their 'worry beads' and the Catholics have their Rosaries. For me, knitting is a meditation."

Like her brother, Fassett has an unabashed affection for the entire palette of yarns and paints.

■ Spicy food — Cima Collina 2004 Newell Vineyard Petite Sirah (\$35)

Produced with fruit from the Tondre grape field, located in the heart of Santa Lucia Highlands, this aromatic wine features spicy, sweet oak, cherry, and dried rose qualities, well-integrated oak and cherry rhubarb, raspberry flavors, with a long finish.

What it works with: This well balanced wine offers foodfriendly acidity, ripe fruit flavors and robust tannins that cut through the fat of rich meats and heat of spicy Mexican dishes and Thai curries. www.cimacollina.com

■ When you are broke — Poppy Monterey County Pinot Noir 2005 (\$10)

Like the girl next door, this wine is friendly, accessible and always there in a pinch — plus it's one heckuva value at \$10. With fruit from Santa Barbara County and Russian

This naturally occurring organism that turns grapes into a classic dessert wine also requires a specific combination of temperature and moisture. Expect concentrated flavors in a clear, nectar-like juice.

What it works with: It holds its own as a liquid dessert option but can also be paired with poached salmon with a

■ Nightcap — Pessagno Wines Hames Valley Vineyard Port 2000 (\$33)







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Backyard BBQ: pulled pork, cole slaw and homemade steak sauce

THE MONTEREY Peninsula may be well known for its fresh-caught seafood, but when warm weather rolls around, there's nothing like a killer barbecue to make any meat-andpotato-lovin' person cry with cow-induced happiness.

When it comes to a no-nonsense meat experience, Will's Fargo in Carmel Valley has the market cornered. They've kept the spirit of the twice baked potato, creamy garlic spinach and béarnaise sauce alive, and I recently discovered you can take their MidWest corn-fed angus beef home for your BBQ-ing pleasure. Flat iron, filet, top sirloin, Kansas City, Rib-eye, porterhouse, burger, quail and a fish selection are all available at Will's Fargo's Butcher Shop. Give them 72-hours notice, and they can whip up whole chicken and prime rib dinners with all the fixins', too.

Whether you like a straight ahead BBQ experience (just the burgers and buns, ma'am) or something that takes local ingredients into consideration, here are some grill tips that will make your friends glad they know you.

The most important part of any barbecue is the food, of course. Once you have an idea of how many people are coming to your event, you want to plan accordingly to have enough food and drinks on hand. Nothing stinks more than playing rock paper scissors for the last beer. If you want to save yourself some dough, plan a potluck and assign every guest a dish to bring. The host typically takes care of supplying the meat and condiments, and guests are encouraged to bring sides, desserts and booze.

Once you have a menu squared away, the next thing to consider is how you want to set up your patio or backyard. The key is to create an environment that can handle the capacity of your guest list but is also conducive to socializing. I like round tables for smaller functions, but long tables tend to work best for larger soirees. Set up the food and beverages buffet-style and guests can opt to sit or stand while eating. Folks with small backyards, pesky bug issues or who face the possibility of rain might want to consider setting up all of the food inside.

Last but not least, throw on some music (something festive, but not too loud - you want guests to chit chat and don't want the neighbors to complain) hang some lanterns or string lights for simple, yet chic, ambiance. Barbecues are meant to be casual gatherings, and you don't have to go crazy with decorations or orchestrating clever themes. The emphasis is on food, fun and being with friends.

It's time to get cooking. You can keep things super simple

and go with the straightforward burger and hot dog route, but I always like to one made-fromthrow scratch main dish into the mix. To quote a celebrity chef who fancies BBQ, the personal touch "kicks it up a notch" every time.

■ Pulled Pork Barbecue

Barbecues have long been a popular social occasion in the South, and this traditional Carolina-style pulled pork barbecue recipe uses one of the most underappreciated parts of the pig.

What you need:

1 boneless pork butt (about 5-6 pounds)

To make the rub:

- 2 tbs paprika
- 2 tbs salt
- 1 tbs black pepper
- 2 tsp cayenne, ground

To make the basting sauce:

- 1 1/2 cups cider vinegar 1/2 cup Bourbon
- 1 cup water
- 2 tbs molasses
- 2 tbs salt
- 4 chipotle peppers, finely chopped
 - 1 tbs red pepper flakes

 - 1 tbs black pepper 1 tsp cayenne, ground

How to make: In a small mixing bowl, combine the rub ingredients. Coat pork shoulder with seasonings and cover with plastic wrap. Refrigerate eight to 24 hours. Preheat grill for medium heat. Place pork shoulder on grill and allow to smoke using hickory chips. (Make sure wood chips are soaked and drained before using.) Add charcoal and wood chips as necessary to keep temperature at medium, or 200-225°F. Smoke pork shoulder for five-six hours or until internal temperatures reach 185°F. Baste every 20 minutes during the last few hours of cooking. When the pork is completely cooked, shred, sauce and serve. (Boil sauce used for basting before applying to cooked food.)

■ Homemade Steak Sauce

Steak sauce is my favorite fix for making a less-than-perfect piece of meat taste great. It works equally well as a marinade for chicken or portabella mushrooms, a topping for burgers or for dipping French fries.

What you need:

1 cup ketchup

1/2 cup onion, coarsely chopped

1 large clove garlic

1/4 cup water

1/4 cup Worcestershire sauce

1/4 cup lemon juice

1/4 cup white vinegar

2 tbs soy sauce 2 tbs brown sugar

1 tbs prepared mustard

How to make: Combine all ingredients in a saucepan and simmer uncovered for 30 minutes or until it reaches a reasonably thick consistency, stirring occasionally. Cool. Strain to remove onion and garlic. Store in refrigerator.

If you get stuck and need a culinary crutch to make your BBQ a smashing success, turn to these can't-live-without cookbooks. They're packed with lots of practical "how to" pointers and enough mouthwatering recipes to make any apron-clad, spatula-wielding person a certifiable grill mae-

AFTER RAISING a family and managing a world-famous restaurant, Holly Fassett woke up one morning and discovered she had yet another talent.

"I never thought of myself as an artist," explained Fassett, who will be on hand at the Big Sur Gallery in Carmel Saturday, May 19, from 3 to 5 p.m. "I was always working and raising the kids."

Then, on a fateful day in 1993, Fassett came across a newspaper article about a painting class.

"The class was called, 'Painting for Beginners Only," recalled Fassett, who was just 5 when her parents opened the landmark Nepenthe restaurant in 1949. "Something just clicked, and I went right to the phone and dialed the number. I never would have done it if they called it an 'art class.'

Fassett quickly immersed herself in her


Country Joe, '60s protest icon, pays tribute to Woody Guthrie

COUNTRY JOE McDonald once lived with Janis Joplin, shared the bill with Jimi Hendrix and the Who at the Monterey Pop Festival, and led nearly a half-million hippies in an obscene cheer at Woodstock.

Yet when the 65-year-old singer-songwriter plays at Fernwood Resort in Big Sur Friday, May 18, at 9 p.m., he will pay tribute to a folksinger - Woody Guthrie - whose name isn't generally associated with those heady times in the late 1960s when rock 'n' roll experienced some of its most colorful

Guthrie had a profound influence on one of rock's greatest visionaries, Bob Dylan. And Guthrie's words and music sank deep into the consciousness of another singer-



On the left is Country Joe McDonald at the Monterey Pop Festival in 1967. On the right is the singer and songwriter


songwriter as he was growing up in Southern California in the late 1940s and early 1950s.

"He came into my life the day I was born," said McDonald of Guthrie's music. "My parents played 78 rpm records of his music all the time. When I was young, I kind of took his music for granted."

McDonald's parents embraced leftist politics, and those sentiments were on display in



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

the folk music they played in their home. And Guthrie was one of the patron saints of

the American socialist movement. "My parents played a lot of political music," he said. "I grew up with the idea that writing political music was a natural thing."

Going to San Francisco

After serving as an air traffic controller in the U.S. Navy from 1959 to 1962, McDonald moved to Berkeley with the intention of furthering his formal education. But he soon was captivated by the folk revival of that era, which seamlessly was mixing politics and music. By 1965, rock 'n' roll had entered the scene, and soon the action was moving across the bay to Haight-Ashbury, a rundown San Francisco neighborhood that two years later would be the epicenter of the legendary Summer of Love. Against this backdrop, Country Joe and the Fish was formed.

"I was the only Joe in the band," conceded McDonald when asked where the "Country" in his name came from.

It was during this time that McDonald wrote the band's signature song, the protest anthem, "I Feel Like I'm A Fixin' To Die Rag."

"It just popped into my head one day in 1965," he recalled. "It took about 20 minutes

Country Joe and the Fish attracted a loyal following at concert halls like the Fillmore and the Avalon Ballroom, where they shared the stage with other new groups like the Grateful Dead, the Jefferson Airplane and Big Brother and the Holding Company, which featured a then-unknown lead singer named Janis Joplin. McDonald and Joplin became romantically involved.

"In spite of her image, she was a regular person," McDonald recalled. "She enjoyed doing regular things, like walking around town and hanging out with friends. But she was pretty ambitious. And she became a star, that's for sure."

From Monterey Pop to Woodstock

By the summer of 1967, the San Francisco music scene had grown into a national phenomenon. In June, the Monterey County Fairgrounds hosted the Monterey Pop Festival, arguably the greatest concentration of rock 'n' roll talent ever assembled on one stage. Country Joe and the Fish performed at the concert, and McDonald was particularly impressed with two new acts,

Jimi Hendrix (who played the guitar behind his back and set fire to it on the Monterey Fairgrounds stage at the end of his set) and the Who (the band des-troyed their equipment at the

Over the next two years, Country Joe and the Fish enjoyed modest commercial success and a busy touring schedule. Then came the second great music festival in rock history, Woodstock. Again, Country Joe and the Fish took the stage, following up Richie Havens' mesmerizing concert-opening performance.

"The crowd was the star at Woodstock," he said. "The audience was so big."

In the 38 years that have passed since Woodstock, McDonald has continued to tour and record solo albums, carving out a small but enduring niche in pop music history.

Another millennium, another war

While the musical limelight has escaped McDonald in recent years, his affection for mixing politics and music occasionally has landed him in the headlines. In 2005, political commentator Bill O'Reilly compared McDonald with Fidel Castro after the singersongwriter participated in an anti-war rally.

"I took it as a compliment," said McDonald. "Castro is the leader of a country and I'm not. It's not everyday I get compared to someone like that."

McDonald also defended his patriotism.

"Bill O'Reilly is not a military veteran and I am," he said. "He should just keep his mouth shut.'

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

will officially be in a drought.

The MPWMD and California American Water Co. have begun a new three-part campaign aimed at the Peninsula's 40,000 water customers.

"People need to be even more conscientious about their water use," said Cal Am community relations manager Catherine Bowie. "We have to prepare for what could be a hot, dry summer."

The water message, spread through mailers and newspaper advertisements, will remind residents to adhere to outdoor watering schedules and other Stage 1 water conservation rules, and to urge Cal Am customers to take immediate steps to reduce their water consumption.

Berger said it's hoped an increase in water savings by customers will "help delay or avoid the need for emergency conservation rate increases and other actions to bring demand

Conservation is also more important this year than in the past because of new pumping restrictions on the Seaside Aguifer, Bowie said.

Her company has been under an order to reduce pumping from the Carmel River by about 60 percent. But environmental and regulatory rules have delayed development of a replacement project.

Steelhead suffering

This year's dry spell has affected the Carmel River steelhead fish population. Low river flows, coupled with high temperatures in the upper Carmel Valley, make it difficult for the fish to survive.

Areas in the river that normally wouldn't dry up for another couple of months are already parched, said Frank Emerson with the Carmel Valley Steelhead Association. His group advocates construction of a desal plant so more water can be left in the river.

"Desalination is also the only truly drought-free water supply we can have," Emerson said. "Unfortunately," he added, "you have the anti-growth advocates who, in my view, are unfortunately willing to let the Carmel River suffer to prevent growth."

The MPWMD spends \$1.6 million, about 20 percent of its annual budget, to rescue steelhead fish in the river. Some of them are moved to parts of the river that are still flowing. Others are taken to a fish-rearing tank. The money for these efforts is tacked on to Cal Am customers' water bills.

Contractor Dennis Wagner said if the city required restoration of the garage, his client would forego the addition altogether and take the less desirable route of reworking the small upstairs bedroom to accommodate the appliances.

Unswayed, commissioner Alan Hewer moved approval of the design but denial of the variance, since someone had broken the law by turning the garage into a bedroom.

But forcing Harmon to remove the bedroom just so she could add 12 square feet seemed "petty," commissioner Robin Wilson countered, and he proposed approving her

"Where do you draw the line, whether it's 14 square feet or 40 square feet?" chairman Bill Strid asked. "There is little difference in my mind."

And how could the commission justify the allowance, commissioner Steve Hillyard wondered. "As staff points out, we would have to make some findings to approve the variance," he said. "And as staff points out, we can't make findings, so we can't approve the variance."

"We're being told we don't have adequate reason," Wilson said. "We don't need adequate reason — we're the planning

Without the variance, Harmon would have to turn the bedroom back into a garage even if she withdrew her application and opted not to do any other construction on the home, planning services manager Brian Roseth said.

"In reality, now that we are aware that conversion has taken place, we're obligated to pursue that, regardless of any building change being requested," he said.

Hewer said Harmon might be able to seek some compensation for her troubles. "Since the applicant just bought this house recently, this may bring up the question of whether the person she bought it from or the realtor indicated whether there were illegal modifications to the garage," he said. "And recourse might be taken."

The commission unanimously voted to approve the 12square-foot addition and deny the variance.



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

FEELING SLEEPY? While more than two-

thirds of elderly individuals report having sleep problems, their physicians rarely take note of these complaints. So reports a recent study of more than 1,000 patients who were 60 years old or older and had recently visited their primary care doctors. According to social workers who surveyed the patients, 69 percent of them reported at least one complaint of experiencing sleep problems while 40 percent had two or more problems. Despite this high rate of sleep complaints, they were only noted by doctors in the patients' charts 19 percent of the time. This is a significant oversight since previous research has linked sleep disorders among the elderly with poorer mental and physical health and quality of life. The relief of chronic pain

and control of underlying medical conditions such as frequent urination may improve sleep in some people. Effective treatment of depression can also improve sleep. Other ways to promote sleep include having a specific bedtime and awakening time each day, exercising early in the day, avoiding naps during the day and large meals before bedtime, and avoiding stimulants such as caffeine. 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
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

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

costs just \$4 for an entrée, vegetable, soup and dessert, Martinez said. Well balanced, freshly prepared food contributes to better health, while a poor diet can increase recovery time following illnesses, add to the costs and frequency of institutionalization, and diminish quality of life.

Gifts net new ovens

Martinez also wanted to thank those who have supported the nonprofit in the past, including the 15 donors who contributed a total \$20,000 in February to replace the aged ovens and stove that had yielded 276,106 meals between 1998 and 2006.

"The manager of the Highlands delivered the check on their behalf from the Richard Grand Foundation, as they support nutrition programs for seniors," she reported. 

Brazil, an investigator with the Secretary of State's fraud unit, dialed their Carmel phone number, but it forwarded to Alamo,

and Price explained where they were.

"She said she was looking into voter registration," he said. Price asked if there was a problem. "She said, 'I don't know. That's why I wanted to meet with you personally."

Since registering to vote in Carmel, the Prices said they have never voted in Contra Costa County, so they wondered why the state was questioning them.

"She showed up out of the blue, when our doorbell rang in Alamo on May 4," Price continued. Brazil handed Price her business card and said she stopped by to check on the Prices' other home on her way to Livermore.

"Again, I asked her, 'What is this about? Is there an indication I haven't voted properly?" Price said. She told him "some organizations" had provided "a number of names in Carmel" to investigate.

"Somebody must have made a pretty strong case," observed Jane Price, who said Brazil also furnished copies of their vehicle registration, which shows the Alamo address.

Brazil reportedly asked the couple not to be defensive and explained she was just doing her job. "Then she gave this little smile, and she said, 'This is your tax dollars at work," Jane Price said.

Few answers

Despite the Prices' experience, California Chief Deputy Secretary of State Evan Goldberg would not confirm or deny his office is looking into voter registration fraud in Carmel.

"People could request investigations be opened even if there is no substance behind the allegation, for the sole purpose of making it appear their opponent, for example, is under investigation by a government agency," he explained. The mere implication could affect the outcome of an election. "So that's why it's been the office's long-standing policy not to comment about whether or not

an investigation has or has not been opened."

The state usually looks into voting issues after seeing them raised in the media or receiving tips from individuals.

"At some point, it evolves from looking-into-and-asking-questions status, into official investigation status," he said. Between 1994 and 2006, investigators opened 715 cases of fraudulent voter registration, referred 85 for prosecution and obtained 56 criminal convictions. Voter fraud can be charged as a felony or a misdemeanor, and depending on the defendant's history, sentences can range from a few days in jail and probation, to multiyear prison sentences.

California Elections Code sections 2020-2035 dictate where people may register to vote — principally, where they call home.

"There's a specific statute that addresses it, but the statute is relatively vague," Goldberg acknowledged. "Your registration is your place of domicile, and your domicile is where you declare it to be."

Most people use the only residential address they have, but "splitters," such as the Prices, divide their time between two homes and must select one for purposes of voter registration. Part of the code indicates the house for which a person claims a homeowner's tax exemption or renter's tax credit is the voter's domicile, though it defines that criterion as a "rebuttable presumption." The same section also says that basis should not be used if a vehicle registration or driver's license shows a different address.

"We chose to be active in the Carmel community — to be active in politics," said Jim Price. He and his wife said it seemed the state was questioning whether that was proper.

Living in a park

In reality, a domicile is simply wherever someone considers it to be, according to Carmel city attorney Don Freeman, who pointed out homeless people can register to vote. He also cited a 1980s case in which the court ruled in favor of a group of Santa Cruz university students who used post office boxes as their registered voting addresses and managed to get themselves elected to the city council.

He speculated the state might have begun investigating after the 2006 Monterey County Civil Grand Jury sent letters to cities requesting they verify their elected officials actually live at their registered addresses.

In response to the grand jury, Pacific Grove city attorney David Laredo drafted a five-page letter addressing the definition of domicile. While his reply specifically regarded a P.G. City Council member who has long used her office address, Laredo cited several cases.


One 1995 decision "held that a voter even had the right to register by listing a city park as that voter's residence. The court found this sufficient for voting purposes, even though it was unlawful to camp or sleep on the grounds of the city park referenced as a residence."

"I think the only real requirement is you can't vote in more than one place," Freeman said.

Goldberg said the state's five investigators — four in Sacramento and one in Southern California — weigh each allegation, whether it involves fraudulent registration of a name or address, or voting in multiple locations, and determine how to proceed.

"The investigators decide on an issue-byissue basis what they need to do in order to conduct an investigation," Goldberg said.

Since their conversations with Brazil, the Prices have heard nothing further regarding whether they remain under suspicion.

Editorial

The sunny side of a drought

THE WET weather we've enjoyed for more than a decade of winters makes the drought of the early 1990s seem like ancient history.

In fact, people who've moved to the Peninsula since 1992 can be forgiven for wondering what all the talk of a water shortage is about.

After all, the effort to build a desal plant has mainly been in response to a regulatory water "shortage" created when a state agency ordered a drastic cutback in pumping from the Carmel River — not because there wasn't enough water in the river, but because Cal Am didn't have the right to pump it. And while state regulators ordered Cal Am to stop about two-thirds of its pumping, they have never actually lifted a finger to make the company do so.

Meanwhile, the rain has kept falling and the taps have continued to flow freely. Unless you're one of the unfortunates who own undeveloped lots in Carmel, P.G. and the rest of the Monterey Peninsula, there hasn't been a water shortage at all.

But oldtimers remember plenty of dry, sunny winter days not too long ago when TV news anchors used their most serious voices to report that the Carmel River aquifer was nearly dry. Newspaper charts showed the same story: We nearly ran out of water.

So our front page story — that another drought may be under way — is very worrying. Fifteen years after the last serious drought, and 30 years after the community established a water management district in response to an earlier drought that was even worse, this community still does not have an adequate water supply. It's a perilous situation — not only for your landscaping, but also for your job and your health — that should never have been allowed to continue so long. Why has it?

One culprit is the rain. Our water shortage isn't treated like an urgent problem because it hasn't hit home in a long time. The people's representatives — at all levels of government — are taking their sweet old time solving it, and the people aren't demanding they get a move on.

All that will change if the skies stay dry for the next year or two. Even a mild drought will create popular momentum for a new water project. And if things get really bad, people will angrily start demanding answers: Why didn't somebody do something???

We don't care whether Cal Am, the Pajaro/Sunny Mesa Community Services District, the Monterey Peninsula Water Management District, the State Water Resources Control Board, the California Public Utilities Commission or the Man in the Moon takes charge of getting this community a new water supply. Right now, most of them are content to let somebody else do the work. If the rain stops falling, they'll be falling all over each other to do it.

If it takes a drought to get them to act, then a drought isn't such an unwelcome thing after all.

'Measure A lets you decide'

The Carmel Pine Cone seems to think the Monterey County Board of Supervisors is more capable to decide how Monterey County should grow than the voters. I suppose that might make some sense if you moved here yesterday and hadn't endured seven years of the supervisors' extraordinary malfeasance, blatant disregard for the democratic process, and clear track record of voting to support developers and realtors at the public's expense.

Consider what's happened since 1999. We watched supervisors fail at four attempts to update the county's 1982 general plan. We objected when they approved Rancho San Juan, the worst sprawl in Monterey County history. One day before 76 percent of voters rejected Rancho San Juan, the supervisors rescinded their approval of the full project and replaced it with Butterfly Village, a Los Angeles-style subdivision with 1,000-plus dwelling units and a 200-acre golf course on the last remaining farmland north of Salinas and east of Highway 101. When we qualified a second referendum on Butterfly Village, the supervisors illegally removed it from the ballot. A federal court finally ordered the supervisors to let us vote.

Measure A, the community's plan, puts an end to this charade of representative government. Under Measure A, you and I, not the politicians, have the right to decide how fast Monterey County grows. Under Measure A, Rancho San Juan is stopped once and for all.

Measure C, the supervisors' plan, puts us on the same path as Los Angeles and San Jose. Under Measure C, the Monterey County Board of Supervisors will continue to make decisions that favor their interests and those of their campaign contributors like the real estate development interests that have provided nearly 70 percent of supervisors' campaign contributions since 1999. And the Los-Angeles based California Association of Realtors, which contributed \$150,000 to defeat Measure A, will help them. Under Measure C, there will be many more Rancho San Juans in the years to come.

So who do you trust to make decisions about the future pace and pattern of growth

'L.A. in 4,000 years'

Monterey County will hardly become Los Angeles under the supervisors' general plan (GPU4). Los Angeles County is barely three-quarters the size of Monterey County and holds more than 3,320,000 households — which is 3,180,000 more than the 140,000 in Monterey County. At GPU4's building rate of 21,500 households every 25 years, Monterey County will reach Los Angeles County's household density in about 4,000 years!

Additional daily household trips attributed to GPU4 will not create "gridlock" unless Landwatch continues to block infrastructure improvements as they are doing along Highway 68. Even if you accept the LWV's trip generation increases as being correct for the period 2000-2032 (using a seven-year-old starting point), GPU4's additional increase in Monterey County's current 1.1 million daily trips (102,000 to 141,100 daily trips per the League) is only 9 percent to 13 percent.

LandWatch's (of which the LWV's Janet Brennan is a board member) recent opposition to proposed improvements along Highway 68, the county's most congested route, while claiming they are improving the county's traffic level of service, speaks for itself.

Suspected art thieves in court

THE THREE men who allegedly stole a \$40,000 oil painting and tried to burglarize a Carmel gallery last Monday night appeared in court Wednesday and are set to be there again Friday for a preliminary hearing to determine if cause exists to try them for grand theft and attempted burglary, according to deputy district attorney David Frost.

Thirty-year-old Anatoliy Melnik and 34-year-old Vadim

Thirty-year-old Anatoliy Melnik and 34-year-old Vadim Shavlovsky were near Simic gallery when Carmel Police officer Rachelle Lightfoot single-handedly forced one to the ground and the other surrendered. The third, 37-year-old Victor Ivaschenko, was waiting in a car that also contained a painting by Eugene Garin, according to police.

"When they came in today," Frost said May 16, "I said, 'Hello,' to them in Russian, and they responded right away in Russian." Shavlovksy listed Kiev and the others named lesser known cities as their birthplaces, but Frost does not know the status of their U.S. residency.

"I heard they've been here awhile," he said.

If the men are convicted of felonies, they could be deported. Frost predicted their attorneys would petition to have the crimes classified as misdemeanors.
